What can I say to atheists who question God's existence? They ask: Can God create a rock so heavy he cannot lift it? Also, were the angels around before man?

Before Adam was created (Ge 1:26–28) there was an angelic world (Eze 28:11–19).

The atheist can claim that there is no God; but, he must answer some questions to defend his worldview.

Adrian Rogers said that there are four bridges that the atheist cannot cross. They are: The Origin of Life and the law of biogenesis; The Fixity of the Species; The Second Law of Thermodynamics; and The Non-Physical Properties Found in Creation.<sup>1</sup>

God can do anything consistent with logic (Pr 18:6, 20:3, Eph 3:20).

He humbles men (Da 4:37) but ultimately it is their choice to live or die eternally (Deut 30:19).

[Follow-up question] What about original sin and depravity? How could God allow us to inherit sin? And what about the angels? Some people are born with good character and others are not.

God is not to blame for sin—man is (Ro 5:12–19)—and the angels are who rebelled (Is 14:12–15; Jud 6, Re 12:3–4) before Adam's creation.

Regarding Ezekiel 28:15<sup>2</sup> J. Vernon McGee wrote:

...Satan was the "anointed cherub that covereth"—that is, he protected the throne of God. This is not the Eden which was on earth, but apparently is a picture of heaven itself. Satan had access to heaven, of course.

Satan protected God's throne. He had the highest position a created being could have. What was it that brought him down? Ezekiel doesn't tell us, but Isaiah 14:12–15 has already told us: "How art thou fallen from heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning! how art thou cut down to the ground, which didst weaken the nations! For thou hast said in thine heart, I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God: I will sit also upon the mount of the congregation, in the sides of the north: I will ascend above the heights of the clouds; I will be like the most High. Yet thou shalt be brought down to hell, to the sides of the pit." The thing that brought him down was *pride!* Satan wanted to lift up his throne. He wanted to divorce himself from God and be God. He was in rebellion against God....<sup>3</sup>

God gave men and angels a will which resulted in sin (Ge 2:16, 17).

The traits of one's character are: described prophetically (Ge 49:1–28), indicated before birth (Ge 25:21–34), seen in childhood (Pr 20:11) and fixed in hell (Re 22:11, 15).<sup>4</sup>
