

*I am 26 years old. About 6 years ago I met a young man from my church. Despite never having talked to him, he and I both had a certain connection as though we were supposed to be together. He liked me, but never talked to me or made any steps forward. After 5 years of just feeling this connection without anything happening, I met my wonderful husband and got married only to find out that the man that I was supposed to be with all of a sudden moved on as well. Now, 6 years later, I have dreams of how God will someday bring this man and I together. In all my dreams something happens to my husband where he passes away, and I come face to face with the first man. I still have these dreams and the feeling that there's a connection yet still. Is this even godly?*

The man you are supposed to be with (your words) is your husband. God made you to be one with him (Mt 19:6) not another (Ex 20:14).

It is wrong to imagine (Ge 6:5, Pr 15:26, Ro 1:21) yourself being with another man (Mt 5:28).

It is unkind (Mk 12:31) to: your God, your husband, your family and friends, your culture (He 13:4) and not least of all yourself (1 Co 6:18).

It is ungodly to think of another man in this way (Pr 20:6). If you repent (Is 48:22, Ac 2:37, 38, Jas 4:8), God can (Ac 8:22) and will (1 Jn 1:9) forgive you so that you can have His peace (Jn 14:27, Col 1:20).

Think instead on “whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable—if there is any moral excellence and if there is any praise—dwell on these things (Php 4:8).”

Biblical love and loyalty acknowledges that God's word was given (Jud 1:3) and it should be honored (Mal 3:6).

Marriage is: one man, one woman (Gen. 2:18–24) in covenant (Matt. 19:6) for life (Rom. 7:2, 3).
