My husband is still part of the group nicknamed "2x2's" He knows that I don't agree with their doctrine. We have children and I am concerned about them being exposed to this group's false teaching. Any suggestions?

Husbands are sanctified by their Christian wives (1 Co 7:14). Change can come. Families can pray together (Ac 10:2, 30) and find support in small groups where prayer is a priority (Mt 18:20). Christian counseling may be beneficial, as well (Eph 1:9, 10).

When individuals pray with confident expectation (Mk 11:24), it can be beneficial for family unity (Mt 18:19, 20).

People make individual choices to humble themselves before God (Lk 18:10–14)—or not.

A husband's ministry is first and foremost in his own home (1 Ti 5:8). After home obligations are met, then strong family members in the faith branch out into other ministries (Ge 31:4–16) seeking additional responsibilities in the kingdom (Pr 5:18, 19).

For children, the Bible says to: "train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it (Pr 22:6)." Children tend to follow in the footsteps of their parents.

Love hopes all things (1 Co 13:7) and never fails (v. 8). The righteous will prevail and God will not be sad for those who do not (Is 42:4). Men are given every opportunity to come to Christ. For their own reasons, some do not (2 Pe 2:1, Jud 3).
