What I'm wondering is can I still watch comedy shows? If they speak badly about Christ I turn it off but I do find most of the stuff funny. It's really bothering me because comedy is something I really enjoy and relieves stress from the world. Thank you to reading this sorry. God Bless

The Ephesian church was located in a godless, pagan area. The apostle Paul encouraged the faithful to live in another manner. The apostle John said something similar: Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him (1 Jn 2:15).

When the reprobate jokes, it is often: callous, filthy or undignified (2 Cor. 13:3–5, Heb. 6:7, 8). As strangers and pilgrims (1 Pe 2:11) believers do not always fit in in the culture. The masses are evil (Ex 23:2) and few are going to heaven (Mt 7:14). The Christian is to be salt and light (Mt 5:13-16). Salt stings and the light of truth is often painful.

Paul wrote: All things are lawful; but not all things are expedient (1 Co 10:23). The eye gate and ear gate can be filled with rubbish or with things which edify. Do not be misled: bad company corrupts good character (1 Co 15:33).

Men are given a sense of humor by God. The Holy Spirit will let the believer know what is acceptable and what is inappropriate (Phil 4:8, Jas 4:17). When one hardens his heart; however (Ex 8:32), God hardens it further and is fate is sealed (Ex 9:12, Ro 1:28). Remain close the Holy Spirit to discern his desires (Jn 15:4).

God makes individuals unique. The world would be a boring place if everyone were the same. Laughter is a gift from God (Jb 8:21) for which the believer can be thankful (Ro 12:15). At any given time a church is filled with mourners *and* with those who rejoice. Solomon wrote: a time to weep, and a time to laugh (Ec 3:4) and better to go to a house of mourning than to go to a house of feasting (Eccl 7:2). All Christians experience joy and laughter in the end (Ps 126:5, Re 21:4).
