Some say that Paul was the only true apostle and that he is the only one who can be trusted.

The apostles spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit (2 Pe 1:21). The scriptures are: authoritative (Mt 4:4, 7, 10), trustworthy (Ps 119:160) and unbreakable (Jn 10:34–36).

Peter had difficulty understanding changing dispensations and Paul helped him.

Regarding The Epistle to the Galatians chapter two verses 11-14 Bob Enyart wrote:

Paul was given cause to confront Peter forcefully as doctrinal inconsistencies erupted into disunity...

## **[Paul] withstood [Peter] to his face, because [Peter] was to be blamed**; And **the rest of the Jews also played the** *hypocrite* **with [Peter]**. But when [Paul] saw that **[Peter was] not straightforward about the truth of the gospel**... Gal. 2:11-14

Christ commissioned Peter, a great apostle. Further, the Holy Spirit came upon Peter at Pentecost. So why would Paul have such difficulty with him? Also, why do other doctrinal difficulties between the apostles appear in the New Testament? ...[T]hese difficulties appear because of a major plot twist that occurs in the Bible...Their entire relationship, as recorded in the Bible, teaches a vital message...Doctrinal disputes began with the earliest Christians!...Once the historical disputes are understood, one cannot help but see clearly through our modern theological fog...<sup>1</sup>

Believers are to live by faith (Ga 2:20b–21). Paul said, "I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me (Ga 2:20)."
