This claim of exclusivity is often used as a means to bind converts, convincing them that the cult is their only route to salvation[2]. Additionally, cults tend to deny salvation by grace through faith, instead emphasizing the necessity of works and obedience to their specific rules for achieving salvation[3][4]. This approach contrasts sharply with historical, biblical Christianity[3].
