Why won't God answer my prayer?

It is in God's nature—as it would be in any father's nature—to speak with his child and to fellowship with him. We build up our most holy faith by reading his word (Ac 20:32).

It would be the Father's starting point in prayer, for example, to answer *yes*. He is not moved by many words (Mt 6:7); but, he hears when his children cry out to him and he responds to them.

There are things that men can do which would disincline him from saying *yes* such as one: regarding iniquity in his heart (Ps 66:18), turning his hear from hearing the law (Pr 28:9), regarding worthless idols (Jon 2:8) or not dwelling with his wife with understanding and giving her honor (1 Pe 3:7).

It is wise to refrain from acting in ways that provoke his discipline and cause him to say no sometimes.

One must press ahead into the kingdom (Luke 16:16). It is difficult to get there (Mt 7:13-14).

To have communion with God, one must be reconciled to him (2 Co 5:18, 19) by acceptance of his son (Jn 14:6), be obedient (v. 23) and holy (2 Co 6:14–18).

Have you veered off course in your walk with him? A Turkish proverb says: "No matter how far you have gone on the wrong road, turn back."

When one is convicted of sin, the proper response is to repent (Ac 2:37, 38).

God is where he has always been (Isa 57:15-17) and he wishes to fellowship with his children (1 Jn 1:3).

Be faithful to him and he will be faithful to you (1 Co 1:9). Hold on to him and he will hold on to you (Jud 24). The Holy Spirit is there for your comfort, love and fellowship with affection and mercy (Phil 2:1).

Walk in light (1 Jn 1:7) not darkness like men who have wickedly departing from him (Ps 18:21).

He will carry you (Ps 77:19)
