

Who is your holy one in Psalm 16:10?

David predicted the future work of Jesus who would: rely on his father (Ps 16:8), be resurrected (vv. 9-10) and reign with his father (v. 11).

The apostle Peter said that Psalm 16 spoke of the resurrection of Jesus Christ (Ac 2:25-31).

Regarding Peter's preaching on the day of Pentecost Donald Williams wrote:

...A central text appealed to by Peter that day is found in Psalm 16:8–11. It includes, “My flesh also will rest in hope. / For You will not leave my soul in Sheol, / Nor will You allow Your Holy One to see corruption” (vv. 9–10). After citing this passage, Peter went on to say that it could not apply to David, its author, since David was dead. Thus it is prophetic: “He [David], foreseeing this, spoke concerning the resurrection of the Christ, that His soul was not left in Hades, nor did His flesh see corruption. This Jesus God has raised up, of which we are all witnesses” (Acts 2:31–32).” ...¹

David spoke prophetically of a Messiah who could come and conquer death.
