I live in a wicked city and am unable to find a Bible-believing church, make a friend and I have no transportation. I am 74 years old and have no believing family. No one sees or hears me. I have lived alone all of life. I am blessed with a nice apartment, food enough. I believe and walk with God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit in my apartment. I love God's word and long to be free. I pray a lot. Does this mean the scripture Psalms 68:6? I am very upset about this truth.

Christ followers are often left without human companionship (2 Ti 4:16) in these last days because the love of many—especially for Christians (Mt 10:22) has grown cold (Mt 24:12).

Psalm 68 verses 4-14 reminds the believer that the Lord is powerful (68:4–14) over: the world (vv. 4, 7–9), his enemies (vv. 11–14) and his people (vv. 5–6, 10). He will care for and sustain his child.

Quiet time with the Lord can satisfy one's soul (Ps 63:5, 6). Christians can also join churches and/or small groups around the person of Jesus Christ (He 10:25). There they can give and receive comfort (He 3:13; 1 Thess 4:18) until his return (1 Thess 4:16, 17). He is our hope (Ro 8:22–25, 1 Co 15:19).

Yes, we may have to dwell alone when the world around is wicked. I have no desire to dwell with the wicked. I have a deep hunger and thirst for worship with sisters and brothers in Christ. God keeps me safe and cared for but I can't find even one Bible-believing Christian.

The bride suffers (Ro 8:22) while she waits for her Bridegroom (So 2:9, 2 Co 5:8). History records other believers who were oppressed (2 Pe 2:7, 8) or discouraged (1 Ki 19:3–14). Christians are rare (Mt 7:14) so it not uncommon for them to walk without a like-minded brother or sister in the Lord nearby. Leonard Ravenhill said, "If you're going to be a true Christian, it'll be a lonely life. It's a narrow way, and it becomes narrower and narrower...." The Lord took Elijah up to heaven (2 Kin 2:1–15) and He will do the same for his follower (1 Thess 4:16, 17).

The husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church (Eph 5:22). God will be all in all (1 Co 15:28). Jesus' leadership can be trusted (Re 19:11). One can know him through his Spirit (Ge 6:3).
